# Excellence in Planning for a Successful Economy *Game of Thrones Studio Tour* submitted by Resolve Planning



The Game of Thrones Studio Tour at Linen Mill Studios in Banbridge delivers a world-class tourist attraction in a repurposed former linen mill. The development is the only official Game of Thrones Studio Tour in the world and brings with it significant economic and social benefits. This exciting development includes a series of measures aimed at ensuring compliance with low-carbon and sustainable development objectives including renewable technologies such as high-efficiency heat recovery ventilation, biomass heating, energy management systems and water conservation technology. It also includes a new Park & Ride facility that significantly reduces the reliance on the private car.

#### The Judges' view:

This tourist attraction is of a global scale, yet the careful siting, materials and landscaping treatment is extremely sympathetic and results in a scheme which is sensitive to its rural setting and blends effortlessly into the landscape.

The judges considered it to be a complex project which was delivered to a very high standard. In particular: the re-use of the existing buildings; enhancement of the local environment and habitats; use of renewable, local, heating and power sources; showcasing local talent and expertise in film-making to an international audience; and adding to an already high



quality tourism product in Northern Ireland. Climate action and decarbonisation is at the core of the project with a sustainable ethos throughout.

The proactive approach during the pre-planning stage and ongoing engagement during the planning application is to be applauded.



The project has clearly result in a benefit for the local community and economy and reflects a positive re-use of an existing structure, which was well managed through the design and planning application process.

# Excellence in Planning for Heritage and Culture *Enniskillen Workhouse submitted by Fermanagh and Omagh District Council*



The 'New Workhouse' project has sympathetically restored and enhanced the Entrance Block of the former Enniskillen Workhouse, a grade B2 listed building on the BARNI register, to create flexible and dynamic workspaces, and incubation facilities for new businesses with a programme of support to develop high growth potential business ideas, whilst also ensuring the story of the Workhouse is preserved through both educational and tourist visits. During delivery the project also provided a focused Heritage and Education Skills Programme accredited training in the built heritage, helping to ensure the sustainability of our built heritage into the future.



#### The Judges' view:


This is an innovative re-use of an historic building, which integrates economic development and educational uses into heritage, conversation and sustainability principles. It is historically significant, as one of the last remaining work houses in NI, which had been on the Buildings at Risk register for many years.

The project is a good example of a multi-stakeholder project bringing together heritage and restoration with education, training and innovation. The physical, social and cultural interrelationship and integration with the neighbouring FE South West College - itself a passivehaus building - was novel across all levels of the project from energy sharing to physical links and creating and retaining enterprise and skills in the area.

# RTPI NI Responds to DfI equality consultation on budget decisions

The Department for Infrastructure (DfI) has recently consulted on the potential equality implications of their budget allocation, including the following (seemingly impossible) decisions in response to budgetary constraints in the context of not having a functioning Executive at Stormont:

- Reduction of essential road maintenance to emergency response only;
- Streetlights are switched off;
- Reduction to Concessionary Fares Scheme;
- Community transport not funded beyond 30 June; and
- Ceasing funding for Community Places.

Many, if not all, of these needs are vital, and reducing or removing funding would have a disproportionate effect on the most vulnerable groups. For instance, ceasing or reducing funding for Community Places would likely mean an end to the only free independent planning advice service available in Northern Ireland, having a disproportionate impact on marginalised individuals and their ability to participate in the planning system, navigating what are often complex and technical planning processes.

Significantly reducing/ceasing funding for community transport would have a disproportionate impact on older people, people with disabilities, and parents/guardians/carers, who rely on community transport to access essential goods and services which they would not be able to otherwise due to their lack of access to private transport and other barriers such as neurodiverse needs or mobility difficulties.

Reduction or cessation of wastewater treatment could have a hugely detrimental impact on our natural environment, contaminating and destroying natural habitats, harming ecosystems, and causing dangers to public health.

Evidence shows that larger settlements, with higher densities and mixed land use, can increase levels of self-containment, bring efficiencies with infrastructure such as water and road infrastructure provision, reduce the need to travel long distances to access amenities such as schools and shops, enable more cost-effective public transport provision (which reduces the need to travel by car and the concomitant emissions), and can encourage continued physical activity, economic participation and social interaction for an ageing population. Therefore, cost savings, physical wellbeing, and climate resilience, can all be impacted by the settlement patterns which are approved through planning. The planning system has a vital role to play in the economic and sustainable development of Northern Ireland.

RTPI NI has urged Dfl to consider an approach to budget setting which encourages long term sustainable behaviours and works towards the aims of the Climate Act 2022, albeit we appreciate Dfl faces severe budgetary constraints and difficult decision making. Consideration should be given to the more strategic view, of the location of development and the infrastructure that is required to support it.

#### **Interim Regional Planning Commission**

A key recommendation of the Public Accounts Committee report on Planning in Northern Ireland (March 2022) was that a Regional Planning Commission be established. Prior to leaving office in September 2022, the former Infrastructure Minister approved the establishment of an independently chaired voluntary Regional Planning Commission.

The Department for Infrastructure has established now an interim Regional Planning Commission which is independent of the Department and has an advisory role. The interim Commission has been tasked to constructively review, identify improvements, and promote further accountability in planning in Northern Ireland. Their work will compliment a wider Planning Improvement work programme currently being progressed by the Department in collaboration with local government and stakeholders.

Membership of the interim Regional Planning Commission has been designed to reflect key stakeholder interests across the community; economic and environmental sectors. The interim Commission will be chaired by Rosemary Thomas a former Chief Planner for Wales.

The Royal Town Planning Institute in Northern Ireland (RTPI NI) is pleased to have taken on the secretariat role for the Commission.

The interim Regional Planning Commission will be subject to review upon return to office of an Infrastructure Minister or within 6 months of its establishment, whichever is the sooner.
